**LIMERICK MYSTERY**

**INQUEST VERDICT**

**Missing Man Found Drowned**

Dr. M. R. Clery, Co. Coroner, held an  
 inquest at the City Home this afternoon  
 touching the death of James Fitzmaurice  
 Henry Street, Limerick, whose dead body  
 was found floating in the Shannon at  
 Tervoe on Sunday evening.

Sergeant Morgan, O'Curry Street Bar-  
 racks, conducted the enquiry.

Mr. S Cooper, Henry Street, Limerick,  
 deposed to having seen the body, which  
 he identified as that of James Fitzmaur-  
 ice, who lived next door to him. De-  
 ceased, who was about 40 years of age,  
 had been missing from his home since  
 the 10th inst. Previous to that he had  
 been working on the railway, and had  
 received a week's holidays.

Claude Defferary, 29 Edward Street,  
 Limerick, deposed to finding the body of  
 the deceased floating near the bank at  
 Tervoe on Sunday afternoon, while he  
 was boating in the vicinity. He passed a  
 rope about the body, and with the help  
 of a party of Sea Scouts, who came on  
 the scene, it was brought to Barrington's  
 Pier, from where it was removed to the  
 morgue.

Dr. Beausang, Assistant R.M.S. at the  
 City Hospital, stated he examined the  
 body of the deceased, and death, in his  
 opinion, was due to asphyxia, caused by  
 drowning.

The Coroner said there was nothing to  
 show how the deceased got into the  
 water, and he would have to return a  
 verdict of 'Found Drowned.'

A man then came forward and said  
 that when he last saw deceased about a  
 fortnight ago, he was perfectly normal,  
 and there appeared to be no indication  
 that anything was wrong with him.

The Coroner said that there was no  
 suggestion in his verdict that the de-  
 ceased committed suicide, but having re-  
 gard to the fact that there was no evi-  
 dence of a definite nature before him as  
 to how deceased met his death the ver-  
 dict would have to stand.
