In other words, he Labour leader would nullify the ectivities of the City Manager, and throw he whole machinery that was operated with such fruitful results back into the old rut of incompetency and disorder. But the Minister knows his own mind to be led away by catch cries of the brand which lead to confusion and incapable administration. The experience gained by office convinces Mr O'Kelly that the Cosgrave Government acted wisely in giving the capital city as well Cork the management system in municipal affairs.
