Sad Fatality.

Suicide of Mental Hospital Patient.

An inquest was held at the Limerick Mental Hospital this evening by Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, touching the circumstances of the death of an inmate named Patrick Daly, a native of Ballybrood, Co. Limerick.

Daly, who had violent tendencies, was an inmate of the institution for over two years. He was found hanged by Attendant Windle in an apartment attached to the Male Hospital division. The deceased tore up some sheeting, placed it around his neck, and suspended himself from a window fixture.

It was stated at the inquest that life was not altogether extinct when the body was found. Artificial respiration was resorted to without success.

The Coroner returned a verdict that death was due to asphyxiation.
