QUANTITY OF MAIL LANDED FROM AMERICA.

The Hamburg-American liner "SS. Staton" arrived at Cobh from New York on Monday morning, having on board 430 passengers. These included the new Ambassador to France and his family. Sixty passengers landed at Cobh and 500 sacks of mail were put ashore.

"BIRA" LAPS AT 100-M.P.H.

Mr. H. W. Furey, a Belfastman, won the 200-mile international race of the Phoenix Motor Racing Club in the Phoenix on Saturday, the hero of the day being "Bira"—Prince Birabongse of Siam, a famous car racer.

The spectators were wild with excitement and were thrilled as "Bira" lapped at a top speed of 99.34 miles per hour, the distinction of being the first to go around the course at more than 100 m.p.h.

The funeral of Mr. John J. Glynn (94), 123 North Circular Road, Dublin, took place to Glasnevin Cemetery on Saturday afternoon after Requiem Mass celebrated in Aughrim Street Church by his son, Rev. Mortimer Glynn, S.J., Belvedere College.

It was attended by his other son, Mr. Andrew F. X. Glynn, who died on Sunday at his father's residence.

Mr. John Glynn was a native of Gort, Co. Galway. For a period up to 1898 he was Assistant Secretary to the County Limerick Grand Jury, when he became a member of the Limerick County Council staff. He retired in 1920.

The late Mr. Andrew Glynn was well known in commercial circles. He was a member of Our Lady of Mount Carmel's Conference, St. Vincent de Paul Society. He was educated at the Crescent College, Limerick, and O'Connell C.B.S., Dublin.
