## DEATH OF A LIMERICK MAN IN LONDON.

The dath took place unexpectedly last night, at his residence, Guinie s Trust Bui dings, Chelses, London, of A'r Dick O'Gorman, a member of a wellknown Limerick family. He was the ton of the late Mr Thomas O'Gorman, who carried on the business of provisi n merchant in Upper Gerald Griffin Street, and who was a prominent figure in Nationalist circles in the city, especially during the "Spit," when he espensed tha cause of Parnell, of whom he was a strong supporter. Tom O'Gorman, as he was familiarly styled, was, however, best known as the Father of the Amnesty Association, an organisation which he was mainly instrumental in forming in Limerick, and which had for its object the release of the Irish political prisoners then confined in English prisons, but principally the late Alderman John Daly and the late Mr James F. Egan, and he several times went to England with that object, getting the Irish Party under the late Mr John Redmond to fight their cause in the Flouse of Commons, Dick O'Gorman, after a number of years' absence, revis ted Limerick last summer and renewed acquaintance with some of the older members of Garryowen Football Club, of which he had been a member. To his widow and his sister, Mis Ryar, Wickham Street, the sympathy of a host of old friends will go out in their great bereaven out.
