## DEATH OF MISS DOYLE.

We regret to announce the death of Miss Mary Caroline Doyle, who passed away at her residence, Glen Thorn, Ennis Road, Limerick, on Tuesday.

The deceased was eldest daughter of the late Daniel Doyle and sister of Mr. James A. Doyle, solicitor; of the late County Court Judge Doyle, and the late Mr. Daniel S. Doyle, for many years Assistant Registrar-General for Ireland. ## ANNIVERSARY OF THE BISHOP'S ELECTION

Tuesday was the twelfth anniversary of the election of his Lordship the Bishop to the See of St. Munchin. His Lordship was parish priest of Glin when he was appointed Bishop of Limerick by His Holiness the Pope, on 29th December, 1923, in succession to Most Rev. Dr. Hallinan, who died on the 3rd of July previously. His Lordship was consecrated at St. John's Cathedral on March 2nd, 1924, by Most Rev. Dr. Harty, Archbishop of Cashel.

There was an atmosphere of pessimism in the Vatican on Tuesday night. Orders have been given to all religious institutions to offer up special prayers for the Pope, but this order has not yet been extended to churches, in order not to arouse alarm.

On Tuesday morning the Pope was able to receive Cardinal Pacelli, the Papal Secretary of State, for the transaction of usual business. He also received Cardinal Laurenti, the Prefect of the Congregation of Rites.

It is stated that the heat which is maintained in the Pope's room has led him to complain.

An announcement from the Vatican to-day that the condition of the Pope has improved has, to some extent, relieved the anxiety felt throughout the world.

### TRAGIC DEATH OF FARMER'S SON IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

At an inquest held at Dromkeen, Co. Limerick, by Mr. Cleary, Coroner for East Limerick, touching the circumstances of the death of Edmond O'Dwyer (22), son of John O'Dwyer, farmer, Dromkeen, a verdict of accidental death was returned.

It was stated the deceased, who was subject to epileptic fits, went for a walk on Sunday evening, and as he did not return to his tea a search was instituted and at about 10 p.m. the body was found by deceased's mother in a drain near the farmstead. There were only about two feet of water in the drain, and it was presumed deceased fell in while seized by an epileptic fit.
