## Dublin Jury Disagre

The hearing was resumed on Thursday before Mr. Justice Sullivan, of the Circuit Court, in which Anthony Morton, motor mechanic, and Michael O'Donnell, motor mechanic, were charged with burning the Christ Church Ireland church at Kilmallock, and causing damage to the house of the Rector, Very Rev. Canon S. Taylor.

Mr. P. Lynch, K.C., with Mr. J. J. Donovan (instructed by the Chief Solicitor), prosecuted, and Mr. J. Moriarty (instructed by Mr. Robert Moriarty, Kilmallock), appeared for the defence.

Evidence for the defence having been concluded,

The jury retired at 4.15, and after an absence of an hour and twenty-five minutes, they returned at 5.40, when the foreman said that they were unable to reach a verdict.

Mr. Justice Sullivan asked whether there was any chance of agreement if they were considered the matter further.

The foreman said that they had no slightest chance of agreement.

Mr. Justice Sullivan—Very well; I will charge you.

The accused men were allowed to continue on bail.
