DEATH OF MR. J. A. GLYNN.

The death, which we regret to announce, took place in St. John's Hospital last evening of Mr James A. Glynn, William street, city, at the early age of 35 years. It was only quite recently that the deceased complained, and he was removed to hospital, where an operation was performed, and the end came peacefully. Mr Glynn was younger son of Mr and Mrs Patrick Glynn, Mungret street, and on the resignation of his father of the position of stevedore to the firm of Messrs F. Spaight and Sons, Ltd., he was appointed to the position. He was a man of great business ability, of a buoyant and cheerful disposition, and held in the highest esteem by his employers and with all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. In the domain of sport Mr Glynn was a well known figure, particularly in Rugby football and rowing. His principal attraction was, however, the former, in which he played as a junior with Shannon and as a senior with Garryowen for several seasons as forward. He was captain and president for a term, and a player considerably above the average in the finer points of the game. Jimmy Glynn was of a most affectionate nature, one of the best of companions, and straightforward in all his dealings. His death in the prime of life, and only after a year of married bliss, is a great blow to his young wife, with whom and the other members of his family deep sympathy is extended in their great loss.

The remains will be removed at 8 o'clock this evening from St. John's Hospital to St. Michael's Church, from where the funeral will take place at 4 o'clock to-morrow for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.

The proposer, the Right Rev the Bishop of Killaloe, paid great tribute to all that had been done both in the intellectual and in the athletic world by the Gwynn family, and in particular he referred with warmth to Dr E. J. Gwynn, the present Provost, whose service to the University was of a very high order.

The reply to this toast was made by Dr Bell, representing the Provost. He conveyed to the guests two messages from the Provost. One was a message of greeting to the alumni in Limerick, and the other was a message of sympathy to them in the loss which they had sustained of the very well-known graduate, Dr H. J. Gillespie, Dean of Killaloe.

Dr Bell went on to point out the position of Trinity College in the Free State. He was glad, he said, to be able to report that in the new industries of the Free State many T.C.D. graduates were now being absorbed. He further indicated that although the competition for appointments had become much keener, yet the quality of student which T.C.D. turned out made it possible for Trinity to compete successfully still in the world's market.

A toast to the T.C.D. Association was proposed by Rev Canon T. F. Abbott, B.D.

Canon Abbott spoke with appreciation of the work which the Association had done for the alumni of Trinity. By means of its register it had become possible for Trinity men to get in touch with those with whom they had lost contact.

The Rev. W. M. Cargin replied. He maintained that everyone who had been through the University ought to be proud of that relationship.

Mr Niall Gaffney proposed a toast to the alumni of the neighbouring counties. He put forward for consideration the possibility of associating the annual Limerick dinner with a similar function in Cork.

The Rev. J. C. Lawlor, in responding, gave some amusing reminiscences of his college days.

The Bishop of Limerick, in replying for a toast to the Limerick alumni, dwelt on the prestige which Limerick possesses. Its Charter, he said, was older than that of London; its bacon factories were famous, and its newspaper, the "Limerick Chronicle" was now the oldest in the Free State.
