## Mrs. Ellen MacMahon

The remains of Mrs. Ellen MacMahon, formerly of New Road, Theobaldgate, widow of the late John MacMahon, corn and butter broker, who passed away 20 years ago, were removed to St. Munchin's church on New Year's Eve, and the funeral took place on New Year's Day to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. There was a big attendance each day of parishioners and friends—to thank me initial acquaintance of the arrangements could be made—an appropriate tribute to the deceased lady.
