

County Tragedy

Man Shot Dead in the Public Road.

Second Man Injured

Arrest of Landowner.

On Saturday evening last about 8.30 pm a concealed shooting drama, in which one man was killed and another wounded, took place on the roadside between Birr and Roscrea.

The dead man is Jeremiah Maher, a native of Cabb, County Cork, who has been working in County Limerick for a number of years, and the injured man is Michael Flynn, a native of Killaloe, near Limerick.

The two men were engaged in driving horses for the service of labourers' wagons in the vicinity, and when the two men were engaged in conversation while the lorry was stationary a gun was drawn up and two shots rang out, both misses the lorry being wounded.

The report of the shot attracted several people to the scene. The men were brought to the cottage of Mr James Carroll (Landowner of Maher) nearby, and spiritual and medical aid was given and the Civil Guards notified.

Rev Fr. O'Dea, P.P., Drimane and Dr O'Donnell, Roscrea, as well as the Guards were quickly on the scene. Maher received the first shot at the Church, and it was found necessary to remove him to Crokes Hospital in the doctor's car. The party was fully paid five minutes on the road to Crokes where Maher passed away 2 p.m., and the body was returned by the carriage to his home.

Flynn, the second man, had his fingers shattered by gunpowder and he was paraded to the Co. Limerick Infirmary, where he is making very satisfactory progress.

An Arrest.

Meanwhile the Guards proceeded to Birr where they took Patrick Gill into custody, the lorry being seized at the northeast of the town at Mandeville Castle. They took from him a shot gun and cartridges which he said he kept in his pocket.

Gill is a large farmer and timber-dealer, farming over 50 acres, and two years ago purchased by him a boat for the Grand National. He is a married man of about 35 years of age and father of four children, the eldest of whom is 4 years old and the youngest two months. In his younger days he was in the British Navy.

Maher came to Birr to work for Gill about 14 years ago as a servant, but his apprenticeship terminated last January, since when Maher has been engaged as a coachman. He is also a married man and resides with his wife and four children at a spot some 100 yards from the scene of the tragedy on Sunday afternoon. His oldest child is 3 years old and the youngest 1 year old.

Charge of Murder.

Later in the evening Gill was charged with the murder of Maher at a special meeting held before Mr T. T. Murphy, P.C., and he was remanded to custody in the Gaol at Birr until the trial at Limerick on the 1st July. Mr A. Fox, Q.M., appeared on his behalf.

Inquest Opens and Adjourned.

An inquest was held at Birr on Monday by Mr M. J. O'Brien, coroner for East Limerick.

Inspector Duggan represented the authorities.

A statement of identification was given by James Duggan, brother in law of deceased.

The witness stated that he was a conductor and the deceased an animal conductor.

Dr James Byrne, Birr, stated that along with Dr O'Donnell he made a post-mortem on the body of the deceased. He found a circular, serrated wound on the deceased's left side. The wound was about two inches deep and went straight in. The bone was completely shattered. As a result of the post-mortem he found a bullet of gunpowder, powder, a cartridge case, and a cartridge cap. Death in his opinion was due to shot and cartridges as a result of a gun shot.

Inspector Duggan intimated that he was not going to submit further evidence as all the proceedings were pending.

The Coroner then adjourned the inquest indefinitely.
