## Obsequies of Father Joseph Rea.

Ballynahone has lost a true friend, a fond and zealous spiritual guide, and a benevolent Catholic curate in the loving personality of Father "Joe" Rea, originally one of the Tipperary Reas. There were three branches of that name—the Rea "Jacks," the Rea "Coppals," and the Rea "Faddys," the celebrated Rea "Norab" having never married, got his nickname from his loyalty and fidelity to lovely Norab Kiering, of Ballylanders, to whom he was engaged. Father Joe's forbears, assisted by the Buck Fentons, the Moores, the Abbey Wallaces and the Killeen Tierneys, kept the North Cork Militia in check for four hours on their way to Vinegar Hill, and would have succeeded did not the "Clanpes" open the gates Padraig. Norab and Paddy Wallace held back at the bridge of Dorragh Silver Oliver and his yeomanry for which they paid the extreme penalty of the law. The funeral was large, imposing and very representative, and dear old Ballylooby was the chosen place wherein his Reverence could enjoy his last long sleep.

After the Solemn Requiem Mass, celebrated by the worthy Administrator, Fr. O'Connor, Fathers Power, Sheehan and Fr. McGrath, master of ceremonies, and with an imposing choir of forty clergymen, and Canon Walsh as President, the cortege formed up and "dragged its slow length along" until it got to the ancient gate where Willie Bredon and the Paddy Bawn bid farewell to the scrutinizing eyes of the Caher "Responsible." There let him rest!
