

# Co. Shooting Case

## Many Witnesses Examined

### Accused Further Remanded

At Court House, before Mr H. L. Conner, District Justice, the taking of depositions in the case in which Patrick Coll, alias John Quinn, Bruce, was charged with the murder of James Maher by shooting him on the roadside near Dromine, was concluded.

Lord J. Power, State Solicitor, conducted the examination of witnesses; Mr Roger Fox, the accused, appeared for answer, and Mr R. Fox, solicitor, for the son of one of the deceased.

Testified, who sat between two plain citizens Gartel kept his hand buried in his hands throughout the hearing.

Some eight witnesses were examined on Friday.

John Daniel Stephens, former agent, giving technical evidence as to the telephone, a double-barrel shot gun, and some cartridges forwarded to him by Augustine King, he also exhibited photographs.

Patrick Fitzgerald, Preak's gardener man, Killaloe, deposed that on July 2nd and 3rd last night a packet from him was mailed to house of a neighbor who had been sold many white and various colored men.

Kitty Hender, a domestic servant in the deceased's residence, deposed to seeing a gun similar to the one produced in accused's possession on 20th June, but noticed it gone on the following day.

Martin Lynch, a fire-laborer, employed by accused, deposed in Coll's company with his master on the day of the tragedy. Accused, witness stated, turned under the suggestion that a horse of his had been interfered with. While employed by accused he thought deceased gun was lost together.

Timothy Murphy, deceased's son, Cross, gave important evidence. On the 20th June he being engaged up to James Maher outside James Corcoran's cottage, "There are some cattle being selected from my farm. The best bull I've reserved I'll bring you." Coll had the gun with him at the time, and Maher replied "I'm not interfering with you or your cattle."

Witness was also in the vicinity on the day of the shooting. He saw the deceased with Michael Russell driving and James Maher also in it, carrying a load of live horses. Deceased was so pale. He saw the accused's name was written by James Coll following. Accused was in the back seat.

Witness the same drove up outside James Corcoran's house to see Mr Coll come out of his own car and run towards the house. He then heard gun shot, and ran to house to tell his father. Later he saw Patrick Coll passing back driving the same car. His father went to the direction where the shots were fired, and in a few minutes came back, and witness asked to speak to Mr Coll following. Accused was in the back seat.

Mrs Mary O'Gill, Central Hotel, Bruce, which she said she owned, detailed a visit to her house by accused and his wife on the afternoon of the 20th June. Patrick Coll had a pistol concealed about his person. He asked for tea because and when the tea was served and placed upon the table said to his wife, whereupon he said "I am James." Her husband said "I am not James." He asked her husband to have a cigar, but he refused. She did not ask accused to give any address other than himself. He then rose above her, growling like a bear and remarking to her husband "That's feeling like a king now." The Queen that arrived was very received well.

The former hearing was adjourned until Monday at Court.
