widow of the fourth Earl, who died in
1929.

The widow of the fourth Earl of Lime-
rick, whom she married in 1890, and
who died in 1929, May Lady Limerick
was as a young girl in Ireland con-

social workers, sportswomen, and musi-
cians. She is the daughter of the late
