TRADES COUNCIL AND PAY OF GARDA.

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At a meeting of the Limerick Trades and Labour Council, Mr. James Mac-Quane, President, in the chair, the following resolution was tunanimously adopted, on the proposition of Mr. P. J. Cusack, seconded by Mr. James O'Grady -"That this Council protest in the strengest possible manner against the long delay in restoring the Gardai to their full rate of pay. The time is long past when the 'cuts' imposed on them some years ago should have been restored; therefore, we call on the Minister for Justice and the Government to immediately grant to this large body of public officials that measure of justice to which they are fully entitled.

We also request the National Executake of the Trade Union Congress to take what steps they can to assist in this mater."
