LIMERICK TRAGEDY

Fatal Fall from Mill Scaffolding

Inquest Opened

A young married man named Michael Casey 3 Barrack Street, Limerick, was fatally injured yesterday morning as the result of a fall from a scaffolding erected around the new provender mill being constructed for Messrs. Rank (Ireland), Ltd., at Limerick Docks, by Messrs. M. Doyle and Son, builders.

It appears that at about 8.30 a.m. the deceased was standing on the scaffolding, about 36 feet from the ground. He was seen to unbalance, and he crashed to the ground. He was removed in the Corporation ambulance to Barrington's Hospital, where he died soon after admission.

INQUEST OPENED.

Mr S. McNeice, City Coroner, opened an inquest at Barrington's Hospital yesterday afternoon touching the death of the deceased.

After evidence of identification had been given the inquiry was adjourned for the attendance of an official from the Department of Industry and Commerce.
