Negotiations Proceeding

Following a conference between the Limerick Dockworkers' Union and local merchants, the latter body have offered to increase the existing wages of dock labourers by 1s. per day, to 15s.

The "Limerick Chronicle" understands that representatives of the Union agitated for a larger increase, in view of the increased cost of living, but that the local merchants capitulated to the extent of 1s. only.

It is also understood that the Union is not quite satisfied with the 1s. per day increase, and that further negotiations are proceeding.

CYCLIST'S DEATH

Tragic Sequel to Collision with Car.

Inquest Adjourned.

At Croom County Hospital yesterday morning, Patrick Dalton, 84 Henry St., succumbed to injuries received when while cycling on Patrick's Well road, he came into collision with a motor car on Friday evening.

Deceased, who leaves a widow, was employed as a linesman in Limerick Post Office. He sustained severe head injuries in the collision, and died about 3 a.m. yesterday. He was aged about 50.

An inquest was opened last evening at Croom by the Coroner, Dr. Cleary, and adjourned, pending other proceedings.
