A Limerick broadcast will take place from the Franciscan Church on the Feast night of St. Francis, October 4th, from 8.15 to 9.15. An exceptionally interesting programme is in preparation, and radio listeners will be afforded an hour of delightful sacred music, interspersed with talks on St. Francis by the Very Rev. Father Felim O'Brien, O.F.M., Professor of Philosophy at University College, Galway.

OBITUARY.

THE REV. JOHN FALLON, S.J.

The death occurred in a private hospital in Dublin yesterday of the Rev. John Fallon, S.J., St. Francis Xavier's, Upper Gardiner Street, Dublin, after an illness lasting for nearly a month. Born in Dublin in 1875, he was educated at Belvedere College, and in 1893 entered the Jesuit Order. After teaching for some years in Melbourne, Australia, he went to Jersey, where he studied philosophy at the College of St. Louis. On his return to Ireland he studied theology at Milltown Park, Dublin, and was ordained in 1909. For a number of years he taught at Mungret College, Limerick, and in Galway. Later, when he conducted retreats throughout Ireland, he proved himself a very fluent and moving preacher. For some time after this he was stationed at L... and also at Holywell, North Wales. He has been at St. Francis Xavier's Church since he came back to Ireland, about seven years ago.
