**DEATH OF LIMERICK PRIEST.**

The death occurred unexpectedly of Rev. C. Halpin, P.P., Glenroe, Kilfinane, on Thursday night. The deceased priest attended a funeral earlier in the day, and when driving home became suddenly ill. He died late that night. He was in charge of Glenroe and Ballyorgan Parish for six years, and was aged about 68. He was a native of Limerick City.

Before his appointment to the partial charge of Glenroe he spent many years as curate in St. Munchin's Parish, Limerick City. He was exceedingly popular and well known in the city, and his death came as a severe shock. He was held in high esteem for his fine qualities as a priest and for the great interest he took in all things national.
