QUARTERLY BULLETIN.

Important matters, including the position, unemployed teachers, all dispute, the Irish question—granting and cleaning grants, buildings, Widows' and Orphans' allowances, were discussed and suitable resolutions in each case were decided on.

Resolution in reply to votes of confidence was read from Messrs. J. J. Sh, T.D., Chairman, Labour Party, Hurley, N.T., T.D., and M. J. J. Sh, T.D., and in reply to vote of confidence from Mr M. McCarthy.

SALARY CUTS.

Resolution was unanimously passed:—"That we reiterate our demand for the full restoration of salary scales, and we emphatically protest against the action of the Government in failing to restore, as a first step, towards implementing this demand, the cuts imposed by the Temporary Economic Act, which shows gross discrimination against the teachers alone, all other public servants having the cuts removed."

We pledge our fullest support to the Executive in any action they may be compelled to take to remedy this injustice."

OLD MAN'S DEATH

County Road Accident.

The Inquest.

After he had paid a visit to a neighbour's house on Tuesday night last, an 83-years old man named Timothy Harty, of Corelish, Pallasgreen, met with an accident on his way home, sustaining multiple injuries to which he succumbed in the County Infirmary, Limerick, on Wednesday morning.

The aged man, who was a widower, was found lying in a pool of blood some fifty yards from the cottage in which he resided with his married daughter.

Subsequently a motorist, against whom criminal proceedings are to be taken, was brought before a Peace Commissioner.

INQUEST OPENED.

At the County Infirmary yesterday, Mr. J. S. McNeice, Deputy City Coroner, with a jury, opened an inquest touching the circumstances of the death of the deceased.

Superintendent Holland conducted the inquiry, and the next-of-kin were represented by Messrs. P. S. Connolly and Co., solicitors, Limerick.

Mrs. Hannah O'Neill, Corelish, Pallasgreen, a daughter of the dead man, said her father lived with her and her husband. On the evening of the 19th inst. he left the house at about 6 o'clock to go to see a neighbour named James McMahon. He was then in his usual good health. At about 8.45 p.m. Stephen Fitzgerald came to her cottage, and witness and her husband went out with him on to the public road. About 50 yards from the house they found her father lying in a pool of blood on the roadway. They removed him to the cottage, where he asked for a drink of water. Later the same night he was attended by Dr. McEnery, the Doon Dispensary Doctor, on whose instructions he was removed to the County Infirmary the following morning.

Witness identified the body as that of her father.

CITY DISTRICT COURT

Publicans Prosecuted

Road Traffic

At the Limerick District Court yesterday, before Mr. J. M. F. O'Connell, District Justice,

Margaret Gleeson, Gera, was summoned for a breach of the licensing laws on 25th Avenue.

Supt. Meehan prosecuted Gaffney, solicitor, defended by Mr. J. J. Sh.

Guard Dalton stated that at the time he saw some men on the premises. He kicked the door and was admitted.

Nine men on the premises were an employee of the premises. The other eight men were arrested and three of them gave evidence. All the men stated that they were themselves as travellers.

The publican stated that he presented themselves as travellers.

Justice—Did you take any notice of certain that the men were travellers? No, sir.

"WILL NOT PLEAD"

Justice—This sort of thing could have been avoided if the publicans could have taken notice of the premises and then say that they presented themselves as travellers. I will enter the record of this house?

Supt. Meehan—There was a fine of 10 in 1936, and a fine of 10 in 1937.

Mr. Shee—The publican was prosecuted for a breach of the licensing laws.

Justice—I will impose a fine of 10. I do hope that the publicans will be more careful in future.

John Boyle, Broad Street, was summoned for a breach of the licensing laws.

Guard Joyce, in reply to Mr. Shee, stated that at 11.40 p.m. three non-bona-fides on the premises were arrested.
