At Limerick District Court yesterday, Dola Co-operative Creamery Society, Sarsfield Co-operative Creamery Society and Dromkeen Co-operative Society were summoned by the Department of Agriculture for selling butter at a price less than the minimum price fixed by the Order of 1935.

Counsel for the defendants said that the letter from the three creameries was altered by letter from Dublin. Instead of answering the letters the managers sent the butter carriage paid. He submitted, therefore, that the contract was completed in Dublin and that if an offence
