PARTEEN VILLAGE

Medical Officer's Report

"A COMMUNAL BACK YARD"

Reporting on the sanitary condition of Parteen village, Dr. McCarthy, at a meeting of the Clare Board of Health, stated the back yard of almost every house was in an indescribable state of filth. It was quite obvious, so far as this village was concerned, that the scavenging system was a complete farce. There was one particular hovel in this village in which four separate families were living, where all the occupants scattered household refuse, ashes, filth of all kinds, and garbage in a communal back yard. There were four rooms in this hovel. In the first room lived a single man, in the second a widow and her four children, and in the two attic rooms were two families consisting of nine and three persons. In all, there were 19 human beings living in a four-roomed hovel, which, if it housed some six persons would be condemned as overcrowding.

FATAL SEIZURE.
