HUNDREDS DEAD.

Cause of Disaster.

When the fire broke out, the people screamed with terror and fought their way to the exits. At the Manchou Theatre, (Manchukuo), on Sunday night, it is feared that seven hundred people have perished. Hundreds are piled up on the floor near the fire exits, which were blocked when the upper gallery fell into the pit. At least fifty bodies have been recovered.

DEATH OF MR. T. J. LISTON, SOLR.

Mr. Terence J. Liston, one of the best-known solicitors in the south of Ireland, died at his home in Tralee on Monday. He qualified as a solicitor in 1896, and left his home in County Limerick to take up work in Tralee, where he built up a very extensive practice. When the Free State was established he was appointed a State solicitor, and since then he appeared in a number of important cases. He married Miss Galvin, who is a sister of the wife of Mr. P. Lynch, K.C., Attorney-General, and his son is Mr. T. K. Liston, barrister-at-law. He is also survived by a younger son, Mr. William Liston. Mr. Liston was the brother of Mr. P. T. Liston, a well-known solicitor, of Rathkeale, County Limerick, and of Mr. M. Liston, manager of the Munster and Leinster Bank, Newcastlewest. Other members of his family are also prominently connected with the legal profession.
