## AN APPRECIATION OF THE LATE MR. JOHN LITTLE.

The recent death of Mr. John Little, of Coolnaree Foynes, deserves more than a passing reference, for he was the most familiar figure in Foynes, and nearly everyone who had any business to do in the village was brought into contact with him, and by his death people have lost a true friend, as he was always ready to help anyone who was in trouble or difficulties, and his kindness and sympathy endeared him to all.

Foynes is now looming large in the public eye, and it is well to remember those who helped to raise it to its present important position. It is a matter for regret that Mr. Little was not spared a little longer to see the result of the work in which he had played such an important part.

It was in the year 1905 that Mr. Little took up his estate duties under the second Lord Monteagle, and for thirty-two years he was closely connected with all the various social and other enterprises of the Monteagle family. Mr. Little had also been Secretary of the Foynes Harbour Trustees for 22 years, and under the Chairmanship of the late Lord Monteagle and his father he saw the port develop from very small beginnings to its present very important position as a great oil depot and an air port. The greatest credit is due to Mr. Little for the very efficient manner in which he carried out all his duties in connection with the estate and the Harbour Board.

Mr. Little will be greatly missed by his numerous friends and especially by the members of the Church to which he belonged. It was fitting that his remains should rest in the little churchyard at Loughill, where stands the old Church Tower, which is a landmark for "the ships that pass in the night," in which he was greatly interested.
