Imorts from Northern Ireland were valued t £386,198 in the seven months this year, compared with £349.817 in the corresonding period last year; while exports Northern Ireland for the seven months nder review were valued at £1,199.484 ompared with £1.299,454 in the corresonding period last year. Fifty-one per ent, of the goods imported by the Free tate for the first seven months of this ear were from Great Britain and Nornern Ireland, whilst between them Great ritain and Northern Ireland bought 4.9 per cent, of the Free State's exports. After Great Britain and Northern Ireand the next best market for Free State oods is Germany. In the seven months nis year Germany bought goods from nis coountryto the value of £504,967, hilst we imported from Germany goods alue £839,346. Our next best market is ne United States, whither we sent goods alue £143.040, whilst the U.S.A. sold us oods value £1,261.387 in the seven onths.
