KILKEE TRAGEDY

Watch for Second Body

Inquest on Miss Lynch

A continued watch was kept at Kilkee
to-day for the body of Miss E. O'Mahony,
who, with her companion, Miss Maura
Lynch, was drowned near the Diamond
Rocks on Wednesday week.

A heavy sea is still running. Despite
the keenest vigilance there is no sign of
the body, which was sighted on Tuesday
last near the remains of Miss Lynch, but
subsequently disappeared.

An inquest was held at Kilkee to-day
on the body of Miss Lynch, whose re-
mains were identified by her brother.

A verdict of accidental drowning was
returned by the Coroner, who expressed
deep sympathy with the relatives of the
deceased.

The funeral of Miss Lynch will take
place from Kilkee to-morrow morning at
10 o'clock by road for Dublin.

AIR LINER DELAYED.

Bad Weather Conditions.

The Imperial Airways Air Liner Cale-
donia failed to reach Foynes at 1 o'clock
to-day, as scheduled. It is understood
that bad weather conditions are respon-
sible for the delay in the arrival of the
craft, but it is not anticipated that this
will delay the expected take-off for New-
foundland to-morrow.
