Justice Hanna, a settlement was announced in the action in which Mrs

Norah Maher, Maidenstown, Bruree, Co.

Limerick, claimed damages on her own
behalf and on behalf of her four children
for the death of her husband, from Patk.

Coll, Maidstown, Bruree.

The plaintiff alleged that her husband, Jerome Maher, who had been employed as a steward and labourer by the defendant, was sitting on a lorry on the public road at Dromin, when the defendant, Patrick Coll, presented a shotgun at him, fired a shot, and inflicted such injuries on her husband that he died.

The defence was that at the time of the shooting, and since, the defendant was a person of unsound mind. Coll was tried in connection with the matter, but was found by a jury to be unfit to plead.

It was announced that the settlement provided for the payment to the plaintiff of £1,500 and costs, and Mr. Justice Hanna, making the settlement a rule of court directed that of the sum £700 be lodged in court for each of the children, whose ages range from two years to ten years, the dividends to be paid to the mother towards their upkeep until they come of age.
