Miss Dolores Ray, the television girl, proved a popular favourite. She combined a fine stage presence with a powerful voice of peculiar quality, a feature being her beautifully rounded high notes. Her songs, too, were well chosen and effectively rendered.

The male partner in the act of Adrian and Audree performed some difficult acrobatic feats on a pedestal, and was as good as the best we have seen at the Savoy during the present variety season. Barlow and Griffith also gained warm recognition with their performance of excerpts from popular musical comedy. Mr. Barlow has a fine voice, while Miss Griffiths is an artist of no mean attainments.

Mr. A. Gordon Spicer at the organ is by now an established favourite with Limerick audiences, and he was seldom more enthusiastically applauded than this week for his selections of humorous Irish songs.
