ATHLONE TRAGEDY

Limerick Soldier Killed

Private Thomas Murphy, National Army, Athlone, was killed, and Private P. Brodes seriously injured, when a motor cycle on which they were riding crashed into a wall at Gallowshill, Ath- lone, on Sunday evening.

Private Murphy was a native of Lime- rick City and was attached to the Train- ing Staff of the Tirconnell Regiment, Volunteer Force. He was about 26 years of age. Private Brodes, who is a native of Wexford, was pillion riding. He was rushed to a Dublin hospital, and is be- lieved to be in a critical condition.

They were proceeding towards Ath- lone from the Roscommon direction. Having failed to negotiate a right angle corner, the machine dashed into the high wall of the railway station. Both men were attended by Rev. Fr. Lannon, C.C., St. Peer's Athlone.

THE FUNERAL.

Large crowds lined each side of Wil- liam Street when the funeral of the dead soldier took place from St. Michael's Church to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery this morning.

The hearse was preceded by a detach- ment of the local garrison with sloped rifles, and the Army Pipers' Band, play- ing mourning music. The drums were covered with crepe.

The coffin of the deceased was covered with the National Flag, on the top of which rested his cap and belt.
