Although for the present the Church of Rome had excluded herself from taking part in any movement for an understanding with other Christians, it would be impossible for anyone who had studied the problem of Christian divisions in all its aspects to leave out of his thoughts, his prayers, and his en- deavours, the largest separate body of Christians in the world.
