HEAT WAVE.

Death Roll of Two Hundred in United States.

The fifth day of torrid heat brought the death-roll in the United States to at least 197. The number of cases of people rendered prostrate runs into thousands. Casualties from drowning mounted among the thousands of people thronging the beeches of towns and cities in the so-called "swelterbelt."

New York has the highest death-roll with 38, followed by Michigan, 27; Pennsylvania, 24; Connecticut, 20; and New Jersey, 18.
