HEAT WAVE.

Death Roll of Two Hundred in United States.

The fifth day of torrid heat brought the death-roll in the United States to at least 197. The number of cases of people rendered prostrate runs into thousands. Casualties from drowning mounted among the thousands of people thronging the beaches of towns and cities in the so-called "swelterbelt."

New York has the highest death-roll with 38, followed by Michigan, 27; Pennsylvania, 24; Connecticut, 20; and New Jersey, 18.

Weather observers are unable to forecast any immediate relief.

GERMANY AND SPAIN.

Priest Gaoled for Statement in Sermon.

Father Rolling, a thirty year old priest, has been sentenced by a court in Cologne to four months' imprisonment for having stated in a sermon that events such as those in Spain might also happen in Germany. He declared that he had intended to draw the parallel only in a religious sense, but was found guilty of having intended the remarks politically.

Mr. P. O'Connor Passes Away in County Limerick.
