Wednesday, March 3rd—In point of
numbers a much heavier entry than last
week, and well up to seasonable av-
erage; class and quality fairly represen-
ted; full supply of beef, for which there
was good demand; sold readily at best
rates; well fed young cow beef a free
sale; scarcity of strong and forward
stores; the section of young stores in-
cluded drafts of useful nicely bred feeders
which met ready buyers, especially year-
ling bullocks. Trade showed improved
stability, with a stiffening in prices, and a
firmer tone in general position of market;
choicer grades satisfactorily cashed at
top rates, and full attendance of buyers.
Entry of yearlings included some nice lots,
for which there was competition, and a
good selling trade. Fat bullocks, £10 5s—
£14 10s; fat cows, £5 15s—£9; 2-yr. old
bullocks and heifers, £5—£9 17s 6d; year-
lings, best, £5—£6 10s. second run, £2
