## REV. ROBERT HUGH SEMPLE

The death occurred suddenly on Mon-  
day, at his residence 6 Prince of Wales  
Terrace, Bray, of the Rev. R. H. Semple,  
M.A. (Cantab.), minister-emeritus of  
Limerick Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Semple had a distinguished career,  
graduating with First Honours in Queen's  
College Cambridge University, where he took  
Mathematical Tripos. On the conclusion  
of his college course he became assistant  
to the Rev. Dr. John Watson (Ian Mac-  
laren) in Sefton Park, Liverpool, and in  
August, 1891, was ordained in Down-  
patrick, where he ministered for almost  
five years. In 1895 he was installed as  
minister of Limerick, where he remained  
until his retirement in 1919.

During the war he acted as Officiating  
Chaplain to the troops in Limerick, many  
of whom have reason to remember his  
kindly hospitality and understanding sym-  
pathy, in which service he was constantly  
supported by the gracious personality of  
his wife. His comparatively early retire-  
ment was necessitated by ill-health.

Spending the closing years of his life  
in Bray, he exercised an indirect but  
nevertheless considerable influence on the  
congregation there. His passing leaves  
Bray very much the poorer for the loss of  
a true Christian gentleman.
