Causes Child's Death

City Child Dies from Burns

The tragic death of a little girl, aged 8 years was investigated at an inquest held at St John's Hospital, Limerick, on Thursday by Mr J S McNeice, City October.

The oblid Angela O'Neil, was disgister of Michael O'Neil, a fireman, employed at the G.S. Hailways, and she died at St John's Hospital from the effects of severe burns when her clothing was see slight by a Christians candle at her home on Mon

day night.

Evidence of identification was given by her father. His daughter, Angela, b- deponed, was in the house with a younger child on the fate of the neourence. His wife and other children were absent. He was satisfied that the occurrence was a pure accident. His wife was most o-reful of the children. She was unwell and o-uid not attend the inquest.

Dr Rridget Crawford stated that when the child was admitted to hospital she was hadly burnt and in a state of collapse. Death, in her opinion, was due to shock caused by severe burns.

George Baker, 36 Rosea Avenue, described how he was leaving his home, which is faving O'Neill's house, on the 5th inst.

He saw Angela O'Neill stanting at the door coveleped in finner; she was calling for witness's wife. Witness rushed over to her and threw his coat around her. He ancoseded in extinguishing the fiames, and the girl was then taken to heapths! There was another child of four years in the house, and there was a Christmas candle in a bottle lighting beside the fire.

The Coroner returned a verdict that death was due to shook, caused by severe 1

burns, accidentally received.
