A member of one of the oldest and best known journalistic families in Ireland, Mr. McDonagh began his career as a journalist on the "Munster News" in Limerick some 50 years ago, and after some time went to the "Morning News" in Belfast, later incorporated with the present "Irish News." He worked in Belfast for two years, and alter that went to the "Leinster Leasler," being district representative of that paper in Maryborough for a number of years. He was later transferred to the staff at the head office at Nass. Subsequently he become editor of the "Kildare Observer," then in the ownership of the Grey family. Having spent some five or six years in this position be returned to Limerick to edit the "Lime rick Loader," and while in that position be was elected a member of the Limerick
