LATE MR. P. H. MADDEN.

Former Chairman of Limerick County Council.

The death occurred yesterday of Mr. P. H Madden, Ballinacurra, Hospital. The late Mr. Madden was Chairman of Kilmalock District Council and a member of the Limerick County Council for upwards of 20 years. He was also a J.P. and a successful breeder of thoroughbred horses. He was not very successful in the racing field, but had some winners in Ballinacurra Boy, Bridge of Kent, etc.

Road Collision Sequel

Before District Justice Kenny, at Ballyneety Court,

Supt. Holland charged Michael Quain, Sheahan's Cross with failing to ride a bicycle at distance of not more than eight feet from the edge of the road when cycling abreast with another cyclist.

Michael O'Connell (16), in reply to Supt. Holland, "stated that in February last he was employed as messenger boy by the Postmaster at Caherconlish. On the 19th February he delivered a telegram at a hause a short distance from Caherconlish, and on his way home at Pust he collided with defendant, who was cycling abreast with another man. Witness had a light on his bicycle and at the time of the collision was cycling on his own side of the road. As a result of the impact witness's bicycle was damaged, and his nose was injured. The other two men were not travelling on their correct side of the thoroughfare, and only one of them had a light on his bicycle.

Sergeant Considine, in reply to the Superintendent, stated that when visited the scene of the collision on the 20th February he saw a pool of blood about six seet three inches from the grass margin on the left side of the road. He also found some broken glass off an electric lamp. The road at the point of impact was 17 feet wide.

BULL INSPECTION

Obstruction Charge

OBSTRUCTION CHARGES.

The Minister for Agriculture charged James Bateman, Castlequarter, Fedamore, with obstructing a Department Inspector while he was carrying out an inspection of bulls on the 19th February.

Mr. Power, State Solicitor, prosecuting, said that there were two summonses for obstruction against the defendant. On the date in question an Inspector rejected two bulls belonging to Bateman, and the latter's son evidently resented the judgment of the Inspector, and when he (the Inspector) went to put the rejection mark on the animals the son took the bulls away, with the result that the inspector was not able to mark them. The defendant was pleading guilty to the charges. "As regards the inspection of balls "generally," said Mr. Power, "I have been wited to date that every year there are about 14,000 lates examined. in other words, there are from 30 to 100 examined at each local centre. 3,000 to 5,000 of the bulls examined are found to be unsuitable, and the number of appeals actually lodged against the decision of the Minister to refuse licences is generally less than 4 per cent. of the number rejected.

Bateman, the defendant, in evidence, said that when one of the bulls-a pet bull-was rejected, his son snapped the halter and drove the animal away. He (the son) was very disappointed when the bull was rejected.

Defendant was fined 10s on each summons, and ordered to pay 2s costs in each case.
