WOMAN'S SAD DEATH

Shocking Tragedy

Inquest Proceedings

An elderly woman, named Mrs. Maud Bruce, Bengal Terrace, Limerick, was killed almost instantly, when struck by a lorry in Mulgrave Street on Saturday evening.

She was proceeding home, and ap-parently the lorry swerved on to the footpath, striking her, and inflicting such serious njures that she died soon after. The body was removed to the County Infirmmary.

Dr. Annie Murnane Power, Deputy County Coroner, with a jury, opened an inquest at the County Infirmmary this afternoon touching the death of the de-ceased.

Supt. J. Meehan conducted the en-quiry.

Evidence of identification was given by Mr. A. Hutchinson, 19 O'Curry St., who stated the deceased was his sister, and a widow.

DOCTOR'S EVIDENCE.

Dr. J. Byrnes, County Infirmmary, de-posed to holding a post-mortem exami-nation of the body. Death, in his opinion, was due to shock, following in-juries to the head, ribs, and abdomen, consistent with being knocked down by a motor vehicle.

The Coroner, on the application of Supt. Meehan, adjourned the inquest, pending possible proceedings.

Mr. A. J. Blood-Smith, solr., repre-sented the next of kin, and Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solr, represented H. McNa-mara, New Road, Singland, the driver of the vehicle.

The Coroner, Supt. Meehan, Mr. O'Malley (on behalf of the driver), and the jury joined in expressing sympathy with the family of the deceased.
