Lord Stanley Agrees with Mr. MacEntee

The agreement between Great Britain and Eire was referred to by Lord Stanley, the Dominions Secretary, speaking at Kirby, Moorside, Yorkshire, as the beginning of a new and happier era.

Lord Stanley said that the Finance Minister of Eire (Mr. MacEntee) referred the other day to Great Britain as its “sister island,” and declared that there were ties of friendship which should draw the two countries together as free people in a friendship that would endure.

“I associate myself,” said Lord Stanley, “with those sentiments, and, so long as this is the spirit which inspires both Governments, we can rest assured that the feelings of friendship between the two countries will grow in strength and that good-will will increase.”

Two thousand Tertiaries of the Third Order of St. Francis, from Limerick and Drogheda, visited Killarney on Sunday.

The Limerick excursionists were accompanied by Rev. Fr. Fridoline, O.F.M., and Rev. Fr. Adrian, O.F.M., and the St. John's Brass Band. The Drogheda contingent was led by Rev. Fr. Flanagan, O.F.M., and Rev. Fr. Eunan, O.F.M. High Mass was celebrated in the Franciscan Church by Rev. Fr. Raphael, O.F.M., assisted by Rev. Fr. Isidore, O.F.M., Guardian, and Rev. Fr. Ephraim, O.F.M.

During the Mass, Rev. Fr.
