TO CUST DUNLAOGHAIRE

Dublin Plans.

Plans to oust Dun Laoghaire from the position of Eire's main passenger gateway to Britain are being considered as a result of the visit of Lord Stamp, President of the London, Midland and Scottish Railway, to Mr. Sean Lemass, Ministry for Industry and Commerce.

The construction of boats bigger and faster than those now in use is contemplated.

If this is done it is likely that the Port of Dublin will be used for the express passenger service to and from Holyhead instead of Dun Laoghaire, eight miles south of Dublin.

Within recent years, and especially this year, there has been overcrowding on the steamers during the height of the tourist season.

Those in favour of the change from Dun Laoghaire to Dublin point out that the majority of passengers arriving at Dun Laoghaire from Holyhead are for the Dublin area, and have to continue their journey by rail.

FATAL CRASH.

Resumed Inquest on Co. Limerick Driver.

A verdict of accidental death was returned at the resumed inquest at Pallasgreen, Co. Limerick, into the death of Patrick Byrnes, Ahane, who lost his life so tragically on June 22nd, when the lorry he was driving crashed into a licensed premises at New Pallas. The inquest was held by Dr. J. J. Clery, with a jury.

Medical evidence was tendered by Dr. E. J. McEnery, Doon. Another passenger in the lorry was Mr. Denis Mortell, Bruff, who sustained extensive injuries. He has now almost completely recovered.

mand in the case. Investigations not been completed owing to the fact that certain information requested by the Army authorities had not yet been supplied.

Justice—Was it the Army authority who initiated these proceedings?

Inspector—No, sir. Sergeant D. O'Donnell was responsible for these proceedings. There are a number of other cases being investigated in connection with the use of these Army vouchers, and it is necessary that the Army authorities supply us with certain details. Army people knew nothing of the matter until it was brought to notice by Sergeant Griffin.

Justice—I thought that the people may have instituted these proceedings, and then allowed it to fire. I am always reluctant to keep an untried man in custody.

DIFFICULT TO PROCURE.

Sergeant Griffin said that the information sought from the Army was difficult to procure, since hundreds of vouchers had to be examined. In the case of O'Donnell thirteen railway vouchers had to be traced.

O'Donnell informed the Justice that he intended to plead guilty to any charge preferred against him.

Inspector Brazil — I understand that the defendant has intimate knowledge and a willingness to plead guilty, provided it is tried by you. In that case it would be possible to bring the case under Section 3 of the Larceny Act, 1861, and you would then have jurisdiction. I believe that there are four or five witnesses who will have to come from various parts of the country.

The Justice said that he would keep the accused in custody for one week if he pleaded guilty to the charge. It would be unnecessary to bring witnesses.

Inspector Brazil said the defendant should be made aware of the fact that if he was convicted in the present case a sentence of six months' imprisonment over him in connection with the charge would automatically have effect.

A SUSPENSORY SENTENCE.

The accused said he was aware that if he was convicted the suspensory sentence would take effect.

The accused was remanded in custody for a week.
