WOMAN'S BODY IN WATER

Had Weak Heart and Eyesight

Drowned From Pier

A verdict of death from asphyxia following drowning was returned by Dr. J. P. Brennan, Coroner for Co. Dublin, at an inquest in Monkstown Hospital on Miss Hannah Hickey, of Coonagh Cottage, Limerick, whose body was found in the water at the West Point, Dun Laoghaire, on Thursday.

Dr Brennan added that there was no evidence to show how Miss Hickey entered the water. It was very likely, he said, that owing to the condition of her eyesight and heart she stumbled, and the occurrence was entirely accidental.

COAT ON STEPS.

Miss Jennie Delaney, 4 Lower Leeson St., gave evidence of seeing the body in the water at the harbour known as the Old Baths. She saw a coat and some papers on one of the steps at the West Pier.

Patk. Fagan, Board of Warks employee, gave evidence of recovering the body with the assistance of another man

Miss N O'Mara proprietress, Charlemont Hotel, Dun Laoghaire, said she knew Miss Hickey, who had been staying at the hotel since March last.

During the time deceased was at the hotel her health was normal. On Thursday morning Miss Hickey left the hotel about 10.45. That was the last witness saw of her. Deceased complained occasionally that she could not see very well

Dr. C M. Corbett said that death was due to asphyxia following drowning. Deceased's heart was not normal and attacks of weakness or staggering would not have been unlikely.

FORCED LANDING
