WOMAN'S BODY IN WATER

Had Weak Heart and Eyesight

Drowned From Pier

A verdict of death from asphyxia following drowning was returned by Dr. J. P. Brennan, Coroner for Co. Dublin, at an inquest in Monkstown Hospital on Miss Hannah Hickey, of Coonagh Cottage, Limerick, whose body was found in the water at the West Point, Dun Laoghaire, on Thursday.

Dr Brennan added that there was no evidence to show how Miss Hickey entered the water. It was very likely, he said, that owing to the condition of her eyesight and heart she stumbled, and the occurrence was entirely accidental.

COAT ON STEPS.

Miss Jennie Delaney, 4 Lower Leeson St., gave evidence of seeing the body in the water at the harbour known as the Old Baths. She saw a coat and some papers on one of the steps at the West Pier.

Patk. Fagan, Board of Works employee, gave evidence of recovering the body with the assistance of another man

Miss N O'Mara proprietress, Charlemont Hotel, Dun Laoghaire, said she knew Miss Hickey, who had been staying at the hotel since March last.

During the time deceased was at the hotel her health was normal. On Thursday morning Miss Hickey left the hotel about 10.45. That was the last witness saw of her. Deceased complained occasionally that she could not see very well

Dr. C M. Corbett said that death was due to asphyxia, following drowning. Deceased's heart was not normal and attacks of weakness or staggering would not have been unlikely.

FORCED LANDING

Plane Down in Co. Limerick

A monoplane the property of the Hon. Lady Greenall, Mountcoote, Kilmallock, who was on board, made a forced landing in a field at Crean, Athlatta. Running short of fuel, the 'plane circled over Bruff and then flew westwards to alight in a field, where the process of refuelling took place.

Death of Dr M. Cleary

The death took place on Saturday of Dr. M. R. Cleary, F.R.C.S.I., The Bungalow, Hospital, Knocklong Co. Limerick.

Born at Rathjordan, Herbertstown, Co. Limerick, Dr. Cleary was M.O. for the Hospital Knocklong, and Kiltely districts for about forty years, until he retired about four years ago, when his son Dr. John Cleary, was appointed to the position. He leaves a wife and family.

Coroner for East Limerick, he took the L.R.C.P.I. in 1883 and the F.R.C.S.I. in 1894.

THE FUNERAL.

The remains were removed to St. John's Parish Church, Hospital, the coffin having been shouldered as a mark of deepest respect. The remains were received by the Very Rev. Canon McCarthy, P.P., V.F., Hospital, and Rev. R. Power, C.C., Hospital, at the church, where prayers were offered for the repose of his soul. The interment took place at the adjoining cemetery on the following day, after Office and Requiem Mass, of which Very Rev. Canon McCarthy was the celebrant, and over which Most Rev. Dr. Heelan, Bishop of Iowa, U.S.A., presided.

The chief mourners were:—Mrs. M. R. Cleary (widow); the Misses Teresa and Frances Cleary (daughters); Dr. John and Mrs. Cleary (son and daughter-in-law); Messrs. Arthur and Charles Cleary, accountant, Board of Health (sons); Messrs Richard and Thomas Cleary (brothers); Mrs. Nunan, Mrs. O'Neill, and Miss Mollie Cleary (sisters); and numerous nieces, nephews, and cousins of the deceased.

Amongst the general attendance were members of the Dail, members of the different professions, and people associated with every branch of public life, and a wide circle of personal friends. It was the largest funeral seen in the district for many a year, which proved the deep esteem and affection in which the late Coroner Cleary was held by the general public.

An Taoiseach and Right Rev. Dom Malachi, Lord Abbot of Coalville, Leicestershire, were amongst the number of those who sent telegrams of sympathy.
