DEATH OF NOTED CHURCHMAN

The Right Rev. Mgr. Patrick Macnamara, P.P., Kilsyth, near Glasgow, who died at Dun Laoghaire, County Dublin, on Sunday, was a native of County Limerick, but had spent almost all his priesthood in British dioceses. He came to Ireland on holiday about two months ago, and had been staying in Dun Laoghaire for the past three weeks. A brother of the Rev. Thos. Macnamara, P.P., Patrick's Well, County Limerick, Mgr. Macnamara had celebrated his golden jubilee about two years ago.

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated at St. Michael's, Dun Laoghaire, this morning at 9.45 o'clock, and the funeral left immediately afterwards for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery, Limerick.

COMMUNIST CONGRESS

Membership of the Communist Party has more than doubled in the last three years according to the report of the Central Committee of the Party issued yesterday, states an Exchange message. For this year the membership is given as 15,750, compared with the total of 6,500 in 1935. London and Scotland are mentioned as the areas where the biggest recruitment has taken place.

The report will be presented to its 15th Congress to be held in the Town Hall, Birmingham, on September 16th to 19th.

PUMP AT O'BRIEN'S BRIDGE.

Mr. Mackey raised the question of the necessity for attention being given to the pump at O'Brien's Bridge. Two contractors had taken the work in hand but had not carried it through and it appeared that a third contractor who took the work on hands only remained at it for a few days. He (Mr. Mackey) had been subjected to criticism over this matter.

Mr. McCormack believed that the best thing to do would be to sink a new pump. It seemed that the last contractor could not get a specification, but whether that was true or not he could not say, but that was no excuse for the Board. He was of opinion that there was nothing wrong with the pump, but that there was not an adequate supply of water. It had been recommended that an artesian bore be sunk, and he thought that would be a solution of the problem. He suggested that the Board should advertise for an artesian bore. He and Mr. Mackey had been attacked in the Press to the effect that there was no one to attend to the interests of the district. He asked would it be possible to get in touch with the County Surveyor, and ask him to have the work done by direct labour.

Secretary—It would not be possible.

The Board decided to await a report from the County Surveyor.

LATE DR. CLEARY.

Mr Hogan said that he very much regretted that the occasion arose to propose a vote of sympathy with the family and relatives of the late Dr. M. Cleary, Hospital, who had been Coroner for East Limerick. His passing was generally regretted.
