## MUNICIPAL CONGRESS

### Piquant Motions for Discussion

Seventy-seven proposals will be discussed by seventy-odd delegates at the Congress of Municipal Authorities on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Urban Council protest against the introduction of alien technical experts into industries and "alarming dismissal of trained and competent workers who are being dismissed to seek employment. The resolution draws particular attention to the beet sugar industry. Motion by Youghal suggests that municipal tenants are unemployed and should pay their rents, and suggests that empty stores should bear the full liability for payment. A fourth resolution from the Congress suggests that men employed on boats should qualify for unemployment assistance when no catches are taken.

The Congress asks the Congress to pass a resolution that urban authorities should be allowed to pay county councils only a proportion of the poor rate collected in their area.

The Corporation decided to direct the delegates to support a motion by the executive committee of the Municipal Association recommending the abolition of nomination and election of members.

## SPANISH PRINCE DEAD

### Victim of Dread Disease

For thirty-one years haunted by the fear of bleeding to death, the Count of Covadonga, eldest son of ex-King Alfonso of Spain, died on Tuesday at Miami, Florida, in the manner he dreaded. Hemophilia, from which he had suffered all his life, complicated the injuries he received in a car smash early on Tuesday, and it was not until just before his death that the flow of blood was arrested.

The Count had had many close calls, and his life had been repeatedly despaired of when the bleeding attacks came on. It was a tooth extraction in infancy that revealed that he was subject to the dread disease.

By a tragic coincidence, his younger brother, Don Jaime, met his death in a similar way. He died of internal bleeding, resulting from a car accident in Austria in 1934.
