key to our history, local and national.  
Give the children a pride in the know-  
ledge of Irish. I make a plea for local  
history which will give a basis and  
meaning to wider knowledge. Parents,  
teachers, and clergy can and should co-  
operate with the children in piecing to-  
gether the traditions of their native  
parishes. The work being done in  
Wicklow under the direction of Mr.  
Price, D.J., is worthy of imitation. Rev.  
Father Ferris has done excellent work.  
From the parish history pupils could  
proceed to the barony, and so on; his-  
tory could be made alive. Encourage  
the children to speak whatever Irish  
they know, and even to teach you some  
every day salutation. Give them a pride  
in their progress. The revival of Irish  
will have great results—nationally and  
spiritually. We can never become good  
English nor good Americans. Let us  
in God's Name strive to become truly  
Irish in thought and in the language  
which is the natural medium for ex-  
pressing our thought.

In conclusion, he appealed to all to

and free.
