The car was insured by witness's brother in Ennis just two hours after the acident.

Thomas Coffey stated that he paid £40 for the car, which, as a result of the accident, became a total wreck. He did his best to insure the vehicle on the morning before his brother took it to Limerick. He put through the insurance at 2 o'clock, before he was aware that an accident had occurred.

The Justice said it was a very serious thing to use an uninsured car, but as the defendant had been at a certain loss he would impose a fine of 10s.
