## CREAMERY WORKERS

### New Organization Meets

#### Election of Officials

A very large and representative meeting of the Creamery Workers' Association was held at the Imperial Hotel, Limerick, on Sunday last.

Mr. M. Ryan (Cappamore) presided, and delegates were present from Waterford, Cork, Clare, Limerick, Kerry, and Tipperary.

The Chairman, in his opening address, said that he was very much impressed by the very large attendance of creamery workers, and it augured well for the success of the organisation, considering that a similar one had been formed only a month previously.

In continuing his address, the Chairman said that it was well-nigh time that the creamery workers should organise and defend themselves into a virile body for their own protection, as all other workers throughout the land. He hoped that not one creamery worker would remain outside the organisation, and judging by the enthusiasm of those present its success was assured. He hoped that it would only be a matter of a little time before a meeting representative of the creamery workers of all Ireland would be convened.

Letters were read from workers of distant creameries regretting their inability to attend and promising their support.

The outgoing officers were re-elected unanimously, and a committee composed of one member from each county was elected.

There being only one lady delegate present, she also was added to the committee, amidst applause.

An incident which led to the workers of the Millonan Creamery refusing to handle milk was explained fully to the meeting by a delegate from that creamery.

The workers concerned had the unanimous sympathy of the meeting.

A meeting of the committee was held that evening to consider application for the position of organiser for the county.

It was announced by the Chairman that Mr. P. J. O'Brien, Ballygran, Leveille, Co. Cork, was appointed as organiser and would take up duties in the near future.

Delegates were requested to cooperate with the organiser.

Mr. D. Sheehy was appointed rate collector for Rathkeale No. 4 District at a meeting of Limerick County Council yesterday by 18 votes to 17 votes for Mr. O'Brien, Kilmallock.

## AUGUSTINIAN'S DEATH.

### Interment in Limerick.

The death took place at Milford House, Limerick, of Very Rev. E. A. Foran, O.S.A., of Austin Friars, Hythe, Kent.

Father Foran was born at Dunbrody, Co. Wexford, over 70 years ago. Entering the Order in 1885, he studied at Mount Melleray and in Rome, and was ordained in 1891.

He was Prior of St. Monica's, Hoxton, 1914-17; Prior of St. Augustine's, Hammersmith, 1917, and was subsequently Prior at Hythe.

#### COLLEGE SUPERIOR.

Father Foran was Superior of the Good Counsel College, New Ross, 1923-30, and Prior of St. Augustine's Cork, 1930-1933. He was again Prior at Hythe, 1933-36.

He was a member of the Institut Historique Heraldique (France) and the Academy of Christian Art (Ireland).

Father Foran was the author of the "Life of St. Nicholas of Tolentino," "English Augustinian Martyrs," "Augustinian Miscellanea," "St. Clare of the Cross."

Quite recently his book, "The Augustinians," was published. This ambitious work received very favourable reviews in the Press.

The remains of the late Very Rev. E. A. Foran, O.S.A., of Austin Friars, Hyde, Kent, were interred in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, following Office and Requiem Mass at the Augustinian Church Limerick, yesterday.

## FUNERAL OF MR. F.H. WALKER

On last Wednesday the funeral of Mr. F. H. Walker took place to St. Mary's Cathedral, after Service in St. Michael's Church. The officiating clergy were the Rev. Treasurer Abbott, E.D., and the Very Rev. G. L. Swain, M.A.

As the coffin was borne into the church by members of the Select Vestry, Mr. Norman Gale, organist, played "O Rest in the Lord," and during the Service the 23rd Psalm and the hymn "Rock of Ages" was impressively sung by the choir and congregation.

The Rector, in a touching address, spoke of the loss to the parish and he himself personally has sustained through the death of Mr. Walker who, a Rector's Churchwarden, and in many other ways, had quietly and faithfully served in a manner which should be an example to all, and especially to the young men of the parish. He was a man of wide experience, and had served in the Great War and the Boer War. His character was best shown in the fact that he was beloved of children, by whom he was affectionately known as "Daddy Walker."
