A FATAL FALL.

Limerick Man's Tragic End

Dr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, held
an inquest on Tuesday on the remains
of Thomas F. Ward, Farranshone, Tho-
mondgate, Limerick, who died in Bar-
rington's Hospital on Sunday.

John Cullinan stated that on the 4th
April last he was employed by deceased
at concrete mixing. He saw deceased
and Thomas Conway on a scaffold out-
side one of the houses at Belfield. The
scaffold was about 20 feet high. Deceased
sent witness to the tool-house for some
boards and when he went to the tool-
house he heard a shout. He next saw
Conway on the ground in a sitting pos-
ture. Deceased was lying on the ground.
Witness saw that the scaffold had col-
lapsed.

Thomas Conway, who was also work-
ing for the deceased, said that he and
Ward were on the scaffold engaged in
putting up a board to carry eve chutes,
20 or 25 feet from the ground. One of
the "cripples" supporting the scaffold
broke and the scaffold gave way. De-
ceased and witness were thrown to the
ground, and witness was knocked un-
conscious.

Evidence of identification was given
by Mrs. B. Ward, wife of deceased.

Dr. S. McDonagh stated that when de-
ceased was admitted to Barrington's
Hospital after the accident he was suffer-
ing from fracture and dislocation of the
spine and paralysis of the lower limbs.
Death was due to exhaustion and car-
diac failure following injuries.

A verdict was returned in accordance
with the medical evidence.

Sergeant Caulfield conducted the pro-
ceedings on behalf of the State.
