## FREED BY FRANCO

Two bronzed Irishmen—Hugh O'D-  
nell, of Burtonport, Co. Donegal, and  
Gerald Doyle, of Upper William Street,  
Limerick—were among the forty men  
from these islands taken prisoners  
General Franco's forces and released  
from concentration camps under the  
change of prisoners' agreement, who  
arrived at Victoria from Hendaye.

O'Donnell and Doyle are among a  
selected group of 190 prisoners of war  
who were held by Franco at the Campo  
Contracion, at San Pedro de Cardener,  
near Burgos, which, it has been agreed,  
would be released conditionally on  
a similar number of Franco soldiers  
returned in the Government territory be-  
ing liberated.

Doyle was captured on March 31 last  
with Major Frank Ryan, the Irish  
Republican, who led the Irish section of  
the International Brigade, and one of whom  
Doyle had since heard nothing until  
last night, when he was very pleased to  
learn that Ryan was alive and well, al-  
though in Franco's custody.

Doyle went to Spain 22 months ago  
and was captured by the Italians at  
Casacina, a small town near Gandesa,  
on the Ebro front.
