### Widow's Application

### £400 Compensation

Before Judge McElligott, at Limerick Circuit Court,

Mrs. Nora Byrne, Kilduff, Ahane, brought an application for the apportionment of money awarded in respect of the death of her husband, Patrick Byrne, Lisnagry, who was killed in a lorry accident while in the employment of Mr. Moinihan, at Pallas, last June.

Mrs. Kate Byrne, mother of the deceased, was also a respondent.

Mr. T. K. Liston, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Connolly and Co., solicitors), appeared for the applicant; Mr. J. McMahon, B.L. instructed by Mr. M. Tynan, solicitor, appeared for John Moinihan, and Mr. G. Kenny, B.L. (instructed by Mr. D. G. O'Donovan, solicitor), for Mrs. Kate Byrne.

Mr. Liston said the case was a rather peculiar one. The deceased man was killed when a lorry which he was driving for Moinihan crashed into a wall at Pallas. He had a wife and four children, two of whom were earning and were not applicants. The other children, Michael, aged 12, and Catherine, aged 10, were at school. The deceased man was married 22 years ago, and since then had not lived with his wife except at infrequent intervals. If there was total dependence the amount apportioned would be £600, but in this case it was agreed that the adult lump sum be £252 and the children's portion £162. The deceased man lived with his mother, who was a respondent.

Mrs. Nora Byrne, wife of the deceased, said her husband never lived with her since they were married. He lived with his mother in Lisnagry. He used to give witness small sums of money now and then when he had it. The year before his death he gave her about £1.

Mr. Kenny—From the beginning you were unhappily married?

Witness—It was his mother's fault.
