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and who are willing to support the project to the extent of the subscription of 10s. per year.  
If anyone is in doubt as to their enjoyment of the programmes offered let him seek out a member, of whom there are nearly 50 now, and ask to be taken as a visitor to the next Recital, which will take place on the 13th December. If the visitor is pleased with what he hears, and is willing to join the Club, he will be gladly received as a member. If he is disappointed, there is nothing more to be said, but it is hardly right on this account to infer that no benefit will come to the populace through the Club.

The Club has only started, and has no funds with which to embark on the costly experiment of giving Classical Concerts at regular intervals, and I trust this will be sufficient to make clear the position and aspirations of the Limerick Musical Club.—Yours faithfully,
